Chairpersons 22 Miller and Sackett called the Executive Committee, and Highway Committee to order. 23 24 REVIEW OF EAST-WEST CORRIDOR STUDY 25 Appearance: Greg Curtis, Project Manager with Bonestroo, Rosene, Anderlik, and Associates, 26 Kenneth Yunker, Deputy Director with SEWRPC, Robert Anderson, Thomas Longtin, and Aileen Switzer, 27 with State of Wisconsin, Department of Transportation. 28 29 Mr. Pesch stated that on July 6, 2005, the Highway Committee approved 2005 Resolution 19, recommending 30 the Northern Alternate Route for the east-west arterial highway corridor between Dodge County and US Hwy 31 41. This Resolution authorizes the release of \$1,000,000 of encumbered 2005 Highway Capital Improvement 32 Plan sales tax funds for further study and development of the selected northern route. Upon request, Mr. Pesch 33 read the Resolution in its entirety. 34 35 Mr. McCune stated that the Highway Committee has previously met with the Dodge County Highway 36 Committee to discuss this issue. It was noted that Washington County has no jurisdiction over the portion of 37 the route that would be located in Dodge County. 38 39 Mr. Yunker stated that at the request of Washington County, approximately 2,000 surveys were distributed to 40 individuals that were stopped at the intersection of Hwy 60 and CTH K over a 12-hour period, to help identify 41 origins and destinations of Hwy 60 traffic. Approximately 600 surveys were returned and the results were 42 submitted to the Highway Committee. Mr. Yunker stated the survey showed that there was no obvious pattern 43 to indicate a preference for either a northern or southern route. 44 45 Mr. Pesch stated that Washington County would be applying for Federal aid on this project and it would be 46 eight to ten years before construction would begin. The current allocation of Federal aid to Washington

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

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Mr. Miller questioned if the Highway Committee considered forming TIF districts along the area, or requested developers along the area to help provide funding for this project. Mr. Sackett stated that to his knowledge, no

County is approximately \$750,000 bi-annually for the rural Surface Transportation Program (STP) and

approximately \$250,000 bi-annually for urban STP. Mr. Pesch anticipates using these funds to offset the cost

of the project, as well as the Highway allocation of county sales tax revenue from the Capital Improvement

impact fees or TIF districts have been established on a county or regional level for the construction of any state or county road.

Mr. Anderson stated that current analysis for Highway 60 shows that traffic is operating at an acceptable level of service, with the exception of the intersection of Hwy 60 and Hwy 83, located in the City of Hartford. Any request for improvements to this intersection would need to be brought forward by the City of Hartford, not the County, because it is a connecting highway. As of today, Mr. Anderson has not received a request from the City of Hartford to improve this intersection. In a 2004 study, it was shown that the west side of the City of Hartford has approximately 10,000 vehicles per day traveling on Hwy 60, and the east side has approximately 23,000 vehicles per day. Mr. Pesch stated that the Highway Department receives an update every three years from the Department of Transportation on Hwy 60 traffic levels, and the last report shows a 10% increase in traffic over a three-year period. Mr. Yunker stated that the Commission has worked with Washington County and each local unit of government to prepare a county jurisdictional system highway plan. This plan looks at future needs and recognizes that future growth will require a grid of arterials, not just one single arterial.

Mr. Pesch indicated the \$1,000,000 that is being requested to be released would not be needed until Phase II of the study is underway, which is anticipated to take approximately two years. Phase I of the study has been completed by Bonestroo, Rosene, Anderlik, and Associates, at a cost of \$110,000. A total of \$275,000 has been allocated for Phase II of the study, which has not yet begun. The Highway Committee does not want to proceed with Phase II unless there is a commitment by Washington County to proceed with this project. Mr. Pesch estimates the total cost of the project to be approximately \$10,000,000, with the expectation that 80% of that amount would be paid by Federal highway funds. Mr. Miller indicated that it is his understanding that the City of Hartford has pledged \$1,000,000 toward this project.

For the Finance Committee, moved by Mr. Gonnering, seconded by Mr. Smith to forward 2005 Resolution 19 – East West Corridor Study – Approval of County Highway Alignment – Northern Alternate Route to the County Board with no recommendation. Motion carried.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UPDATE AND ISSUES

Mr. Miller reported the EDAC Technical Advisory Committee reviewed four ED Consultant Requests for Proposals and selected two for interviews on July 13, 2005.

Mr. Miller reported on the proposed \$60 million retail and tourism development in Washington County. Cabela Inc., which bills itself as the world's largest outdoor outfitter company, has options to purchase 60 acres of agricultural land located at the split between Highway 45 and 41. The store would employ 300 or more full-time employees earning salaries of between \$10 to \$12 an hour.

Mr. Cotter stated the store proposed for Washington County is expected to generate \$65 million in sales in its first year and attract more than three million visitors annually. This is absolutely regional including the Chicago market.

Mr. Wolf stated ancillary development on and near the Cabela site could push the projects worth to more than \$75 million and you could be looking at 500 jobs out there.

Mr. Miller stated \$10 million in financial assistance for infrastructure improvements is needed to commit Cabela to building in Washington County. Mr. Cotter stated since February, he has been working with the Town of Polk and State Officials to find that funding assistance. Towns, by state law, cannot create tax incremental financing districts (TIF). Mr. Cotter requested that the County consider partnering with the Towns and State for the good of this project.

Representative Jeskewitz stated the State, traditionally, is reluctant to help finance retail development, preferring instead to develop manufacturing projects. The State is willing to assist but is limited due to its own laws. Representative Jeskewitz reported timing is critical at this stage in negotiations, and anything the state could do would take too much time to work out, risking Cabela pulling the project out of the state entirely. The Departments of Transportation, Commerce and Tourism are all trying to find ways to come up with the \$10 million. Governor Doyle is also aware of the project and has expressed interest in brining the store to Wisconsin.

Mr. Miller stated it is possible that Washington County could find a way to help raise money for the project, possibly by borrowing money. Property and sales tax generated by the development could easily recoup that cost.

CHAIRPERSON, ADMINISTRATIVE COORDINATOR, COUNTY ATTORNEY REPORTS

Ms. Nass reported the Washington County vs. Village of Jackson summary judgement motion hearing is scheduled for July 14, 2005, in Ozaukee County. The Village has responded to the County's initial motion with a brief and a number of affidavits and she is replying to those documents now.
